Goal 3



MINISTER'S Letter

This article began at the breakfast table in my kitchen in mid-November, Izzy is watching kids' TV in the lounge, Sarah's getting ready for work upstairs and Henry is surprisingly still asleep in his bedroom. Outside the kitchen window is an arresting pink sky.

Prior to looking out of the window I'd been checking the day's commitments in my diary and doing my first scan of emails, but seeing the pink sky stirred my soul and held my gaze. That pink sky inspired this article. In the midst of the challenges which, in this present season can feel burdensome and overwhelming there are moments which, when we allow them to, can change our outlook and enable us to discover beauty in the present moment.

In Matthew 6.34, Jesus tells his disciples not to worry about tomorrow for tomorrow will worry about itself. As we enter the Advent and Christmas season, we face perhaps the greatest amount of uncertainty many of us will have ever faced. This uncertainty, of course, is caused by the Coronavirus pandemic and the questions around our freedoms to move about and spend time with our loved ones over Christmas.

Let me let you into a regular debate in the Trick household. I'm an amateur theologian and my wife, Sarah, is a philosophy graduate. I like to tease Sarah that the future is not real, it



doesn't exist, an idea which when you pause to think about it, is both undeniably true and mind-blowing in the same moment. Let the thought fester in your mind and you'll realise that in any given moment, the past is gone, and the future is yet to exist so the only thing which actually exists is the present moment, literally now.

However, despite the present moment being the only thing that actually exists, this isn't the way we live our lives, is it? Our emotions are normally a mash up of memories savoured, or lingering regrets from the past or the uncertainty and anticipation of the future.

This way of living is made even more acute by Coronavirus, we are so full of future uncertainties that in the present we are overwhelmed. The cost of this approach is that we fail to see beauty in the present moment, beauty which is actually more real, more stirring than the uncertainties we face about the future.

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Recently, I remember being mildly astounded by a Vicar on Twitter who tweeted to the effect of wondering whether, because of the uncertainties about physical Church services and movement at Christmas, Jesus could be born this year? As if the birth of Jesus Christ 2000 years ago might be undone by whether we are able to meet in a particular place at a particular time. I don't lack empathy for the feelings and concerns of this Vicar, I just question whether introducing such levels of spiritual uncertainty into a world where uncertainty reigns, was helpful.

Jesus was born and triumphing over death, Jesus is, in the present moment, alive. This wonderful truth of the Son of God born as a babe in Bethlehem is rather wonderfully non-contingent on where we are with lockdown, or how we worship. This wonderful reality exists not as future uncertainty but as present reality.

This is what the pink sky has to teach us, that if we pause, take some deep breaths, put down our phones and raise our eyes, we can see much beauty around us. This might take the form of a beautiful skyline, or the kindness of a friend, an unexpected gift or a walk with family, but these expressions of beauty are real, they exist and when we look at the them and meditate on them, our souls can stirred and our minds momentarily freed from the leftovers of the past or the anticipation of the future.

For those familiar with the feel and structure of the Church year, this might all feel a bit ironic. Isn't Advent an entire season of anticipation, of looking ahead to the celebration of Christ's coming at Christmas? Well, yes and at the same time, but... Advent is also a time of looking in, of seeing the joy and beauty of God at work in each of our lives in the present moment.

This has been the most challenging of years as we've loved and lost people, many have lost jobs and many businesses both local and national have closed. We have faced restrictions on freedoms and our we all carrv significant uncertainties about the coming months. But try to stop this Advent, this Christmas and allow the beauty of the Christmas story to stir your soul and help you see that Jesus is with you, here and now!



MOTHERS' UNION DECEMBER UPDATE BY STELLA ROBERTS

Every year from the 25th November to 10th December, the Mothers' Union members along with Governments and organisations ioin other the International Campaign for the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence. The Mothers' Union are bringing the Domestic Abuse and poor standards of living to the United Nations by sending representatives from around the world at the United Nations to speak Commission on the Status of Women.

Members of the Winchester Diocese usually hold a Vigil and Reflection outside the Cathedral during these 16 days and Groups are encouraged to hold Prayer Vigils in their own Parishes and Churches to pray for all victims of abuse both women and men. This year because of Covid-19 and the lockdown we were unable to hold the Vigil as 25th November, planned on but hopefully we will hold it on Saturday 5th December from 12.00 - 2.00pm. The Mothers' Union has made Saturday 5th December a Worldwide Global Day "No more One in Three". It is a known fact that one in three women and girls around the world suffer from domestic abuse in their homes or employment. Helen Pain, a Mothers' Union lead Winchester Trustee on Domestic and Abuse and Anti Slavery will be leading a Zoom Reflection Service for the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence on Thursday 3rd December. Members will be informed how to join this Service.

The Mothers' Union have joined with the Church of England Clewer Initiative and are working together to bring to the public the need to abolish modern day slavery in this country. There will be cards and posters available in church very soon to help the public recognise modern day slavery and how to report it.

If the Government does not change the lockdown times, we in the Ringwood Branch will be attending an Advent Holy Communion Service and Annual Meeting on Tuesday 8th December at 2.00pm in the Parish Church. We have the joy to be enrolling two new members at this service.

COMFORT & JOY

EXPLORING THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND'S 2020 CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

This Christmas, the Church of England campaign Comfort and Joy holds together the hope that Christmas will bring joy and celebration after a uniquely difficult year with an acknowledgement that – for those who have lost loved ones or livelihoods, or who are potentially still not able to be together with loved ones – it may be the Church's role, both nationally and locally, to provide consolation, rather than assume everyone will be ready to join in jubilation.

This Christmas the Church will need, in the words of St Paul in Romans 12.15, to **'Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep'**. We will aim to celebrate where we can together in one place – but also embrace a wider community that wants to join in the celebration but may not be physically able – or emotionally ready – to do so. We hope that Comfort and Joy will enable us to build a campaign that both enables us to reconnect with the rich and joyous traditions of the past and to offer God's consoling love in the present.

Reflections: The Church of England has partnered with a number of public figures to produce short reflections exploring the theme. Comfort and Joy: Nine Lessons and carols for Christmas mirrors the structure of a traditional carol service, exploring both biblical texts and the words of much-loved Christmas carols. The reflections for each day from Christmas Day to 2nd January feature contributions from Kate Bottley, Jonathan Bryan, Bob Chilcott, Martha Collison, Stephen Cottrell, Guli Francis-Dehqani, Chine McDonald, Sally Phillips and Justin Welby. The booklet is introduced by the Archbishops and has been edited by the Ven John Kiddle, Archdeacon of Wandsworth, author of the best-selling God With Us: Your Christmas Journey.

The booklet is available to order from Church House Publishing and is also available freely via audio, smart speaker, as well as in app and email formats with accompanying prayer activities for children and families.

Working with the Archbishop of York's Youth Trust and the Evangelism & Discipleship team, there will also be a series of youth reflections produced in December.

Online services and events: In collaboration with a range of Christian charities and organisations, the Church of England will produce nine online services throughout Advent and Christmas. This will include an online service for each Sunday of Advent, a Christingle with the Children's Society, nine lessons and carols and midnight services. Charities involved include Christian Aid, Church Army, Embrace and Marie Curie. The online weekly services have been very well received and continue to attract a regular diverse audience, including churchgoers, people exploring faith, and a wide age demographic.

THE ARCHDEACON'S VISITATION 2020

BY JACQUELINE BROWN, CHURCHWARDEN - FOR 13 YEARS NOW!

A strange name for a church service – it's the service at which a parish's new or returning Churchwardens are sworn into office. It is a legal requirement for Churchwardens to attend a Visitation and make in person the declarations required. Otherwise they can't be admitted to office.

As with so many things, this year's was rather different and Churchwardens Matthew Steele and I were sworn into office online via a service on Zoom with some 200 people attending via their PCs, laptops or phones.

People often ask what the role of churchwarden consists of, and it is rather neatly summed up in the words of the service. Firstly the Diocesan Registrar (legal expert) implores us to, 'seek God's grace and guidance in the the responsibilities discharge of entrusted to us, that we may be good stewards in the administration of our Church, its people, buildings and fabric, wise in counsel, effective in co-operating with clergy and laity, and zealous in forwarding the witness and service of the Church. In the name of lesus Christ, and in the power of the Spirit, may we glorify the Father in word and deed, and ever promote the well-being of his people.'

That sums it up fairly neatly, and the Archdeacon then asks the Churchwardens, 'My brothers and sisters, whom God has called to serve in the Office and with the duties of Churchwarden. Will you work with the Bishop, with your clergy and other ministers, with the PCC and all the people of God of your parish in promoting the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical?'

So if the Registrar talks about the tasks, this part is about people. But he continues, 'Will you care for the churches of your parish, their grounds and contents? Will you care for God's people in your parish? Will you have special care for the wellbeing of the



clergy and their families? Will you strive to fashion your own life according to the Gospel of Christ? Will you be faithful in personal prayer and public worship?

And we respond with an enthusiastic, 'With the help of God, I will!' to each question.

The Churchwardens then stand and say together, 'I solemnly and sincerely declare before God and his people that I will faithfully and diligently discharge the duties of the Office of Churchwarden for the Parish for which I have been chosen during the period of my appointment. And are admitted to the Office of churchwarden by the Archdeacon and confirmed in that role by him.

We conclude by asking for God's help in all of this - 'Look upon our lives, O Lord our God, and make them yours. In the power of the Holy Spirit may we walk in your way, believe your word, and fulfil your commandments; may we faithfully worship you and serve our neighbour to the furtherance of your glorious kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.' We certainly couldn't do all that we have to do without God's help and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Or without the support of our clergy and colleagues and all of you.

Did you know that it is a family in Wiltshire, the Parkers, who claim to own the world's oldest artificial Christmas tree? It was bought in 1886, and it is still put up every year.

Where did Christmas stockings come from?

No one is really sure, but a story is told of St Nicholas, a bishop who lived in the 4th century, who may have started the custom by accident. St Nicholas was of a wealthy family, and of a generous heart. As Christmas approached one year, he wanted to help a poor family whom he knew, but he did not want them to know it was him. So he climbed up on their roof on Christmas Eve and dropped some coins down the chimney.

The next morning the coins, to the great surprise of the family, were found in the stockings of the ladies, who had hung them to dry by the fire the night before. Every year after that they put their stockings out, in the hope that some more money would fall into them. They told the story of this amazing their friends and appearance to neighbours, and the custom caught on.

Mistletoe's smelly history

Did you know that the word 'mistletoe' means dung on a tree? The Anglo-Saxons thought that mistletoe grew in trees where birds had left their droppings. Mistel means dung, and tan means twig.


The story of mince pies

Did you know that mince pies have been traditional English Christmas fare since the Middle Ages, when meat was a key ingredient? The addition of spices, suet and alcohol to meat came about because it was an alternative to salting and smoking in order to preserve the food. Mince pies used to be a different shape - cradle-shaped with a pastry baby Jesus on top.

Where did Christmas trees come from?

There are two early stories that mention fir trees. The first involves St Boniface, who went to Germany in the 8th century as a missionary and found people sacrificing a child to their god under an oak tree. Boniface was appalled, and he rescued the child. He then chopped down the oak tree and found a tiny fir tree growing nearby. He gave this to the people and said: "This is a symbol of life. Whenever you look at this tree. remember the Christ-child who is the One who will give you life, because He gave His life for you."

The second early fir tree story involves Martin Luther in the 16th century. It is said that one year he decided to drag a fir tree into his home and to decorate it with candles. He used it as a visual aid, people that the candles telling symbolised Jesus as the light of the evergreen world, and the tree symbolised the eternal life that Jesus gives to us. Many of the people who followed Luther were struck by the idea and took up the custom.



THE STORY OF THE CHRISTINGLE

Each December our churches hold fabulous Christingle services where families come together to light Christingles and sing carols. This year, due to the restrictions in place, our Christingle service will take place online. The service will be uploaded to our Benefice Facebook page and our YouTube page on **Wednesday 23rd December at 4pm.**

The word 'Christingle' actually means 'Christ Light', and celebrates the light of Jesus coming into the world. Stories of how the Christingle began look back to the Moravian Church, which is found in the Czech Republic. The Moravians have held Christingle services for more than 200 years, and according to them, this is how the first Christingle might have been made:

Many years ago the children in a village were asked to bring a Christmas gift to put beside the crib in the church. One family was very poor, and had no money for gifts, but the three children were still determined to take something. The only nice thing they had was an orange, so they decided to give the Christ-child that.

But then they discovered the top was going green, so the eldest cut it out, and put a candle in the hole. To add some colour, one of the girls took a red ribbon from her hair and tied it around the middle of the orange. It was hard to make the ribbon stay still, so they fastened it in place with toothpicks. The toothpicks looked a bit bare, so the youngest child added some raisins to them.

The children took their decorated orange lantern to the church for the Christmas Mass. The other children sneered at their meagre gift, but the priest seized upon it with joy. He held it up as an example of the true understanding of the meaning of Christmas, for the following reasons:

The orange is round, like the world;

The candle gives us light in the dark, like the love of God;

The red ribbon goes round the 'world', as a symbol of Christ's blood, given for everyone;

The four sticks point in all directions, and symbolise that God is over all: North, South, East and West;

and the fruit and nuts remind us of God's blessings.

The Children's Society first introduced the Christingle Service to The Church of England in 1968, and it has since become a popular event in the church calendar. This candlelit celebration is an ideal way to share the key messages of the Christian faith, while helping to raise vital funds to help vulnerable children across the country. Lighting the Parish Church at Christmas



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

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
